Rear Commodore's Report

After a wet fall and relatively dry winter I'm hoping we can enjoy the river sooner than later this year. We are monitoring upstream reservoir levels and they are currently looking pretty good, we'll see what Mother Nature deals us in the next few weeks.

As usual, launch will be the first weekend in May on Friday the 4th and Saturday the 5th. Please note that there will be a **meeting for all boat owners on Saturday, April 7**. I realize this is on the Easter weekend but it's the only date available prior to launch. If you can't make it, I'll try to post a summary of the discussion on our website. We haven't had a meeting like this for a few years so please come out to discuss your concerns, comments and suggestions about the harbour and issues relating to boat ownership at Britannia and the Ottawa River in general. Some points for discussion will include the proposed finger dock system for the harbour, draining the

harbour for sluice gate repairs, work parties, rules of the road around the harbour and some of the hazards in the harbour and on the river. It will also be an opportunity to meet new members and make them welcome to our club.

The following information was provided last year but it is worth repeating, particularly for our newer members. I want to emphasize the need for members to ensure their insurance, liability and fee accounts are all in good order prior to launch. It would be a shame to have to miss any sailing days with your boat still in the cradle.

With regard to launch, I would like to emphasize a few points regarding safety and launch procedures. We will have a few members supporting the launch crews to ensure that sailors curb their enthusiasm and stay well back as the boats are being launched. We will not tolerate anyone running up to their boats in the sling and applying a final coat of anti-fouling paint on their cradle patches. This is incredibly unsafe and time consuming, which increases costs to the club for crane time. The crews are well trained on safety procedures so when they talk, you listen. We have had serious injury and a loss of life from crane accidents in the past so this is very serious business! As mentioned above, crane time is expensive so make sure you are at your boat and ready to go with your engines, props and plugs good to go. Also, any car blocking the movement of a crane will be towed at the owners risk and expense. Use common sense in where you park your car and don't be shy to point out to anyone their car should be moved. Most of us are familiar with launch procedures but it only takes one car to hold up our

progress. I expect the Rope Man will be at our launch if you have any need for line or other accessories.

And let's keep a very important point in mind during launch, **we are all volunteers** and we all have varying degrees of knowledge and experience. Let's be civil and courteous at all times, sailing should decrease our stress, not contribute to it.

The crew chiefs are assembling their respective group members but we can always use additional help so if you would like to volunteer, please let me know and I'll pass your name along. The week after launch we will be having a work party day so any suggestions you may have for improvements to the harbour (and I know there are a few), please pass those along as well. Remember, if you make a suggestion you should be willing to show up and work on that particular project.

I have received some requests for mooring changes so we will try to sort those out in advance of launch day. Please keep an eye on our website for updates and the latest breaking news as we are reducing the number of F&B's for publication this year. If you have any questions, concerns or suggestions, please drop me a line at harbourmaster@byc.ca.

This is my last year as Harbourmaster and Rear Commodore. If anyone is interested in running for the position next year, I would be happy to keep them in the loop on the requirements of the position and prepare them for their duties next year. I can't prejudge the nominations of the selection committee but all are welcome if interested.

Although we are starting this year in better financial shape than we did the last one, we still have to live within our means and keep our belts tight, so to speak. However, even though the money available to spend on the clubhouse is limited there are two sources of finance that I would like to see utilised; the Capital and Cyclical Renewal Funds. When members subscribe to these funds they have the opportunity to identify what the money should be devoted to. However, under the current circumstances where the club should be spruced up to make more attractive and where there is costly maintenance that must be addressed, I believe the Board should be allowed to assign spending priorities in these areas as it sees fit.

Those of you who have come into the clubhouse through the front door recently must have noticed the impressive new entrance porch; that should really help to keep out the winter winds. Credit goes to Simon Fuller for initiating and coordinating this project.

Although the list of completed jobs continues to grow, the list of work items that still face us grows faster - that's the reality of an aging clubhouse, I suppose. Nevertheless, we are making progress; the already-mentioned porch is an obvious leap forward. These

incremental improvements, which definitely improve the appearance and utility of the clubhouse, are very often done by club members, and I'm sure I speak for the whole membership in thanking these unsung heroes for their efforts. It's members like these that make Britannia the solid club that it is.

With ice still on the water as this is being written it may seem premature to be thinking of the Easter Seals Regatta; however, the organization of that event is already underway. The sailing activities themselves take place on July 14 and the auctions take place at BYC on the evening of the July 13. I strongly encourage you to pencil these dates on your calendar and to start thinking about participating in the event to raise money for people less fortunate than ourselves. Although volunteers willing to help with running the event are already coming forward, there is always need for more and if you would like to help, please contact myself or Amie Geraghty.

NEW FEATURES ON THE BYC WEB SITE

The BYC Web site (www.byc.ca) now has a "Members' Area" which allows BYC Members to examine and change some of their membership data, access an on-line version of the Membership Directory, make dinner and other event reservations, create entries for and search a Crew Bank. More features will be added in the future.

In order to use the system, your e-mail address must be on file with the Club office. If you are not sure if we have your current e-mail address, phone the office, or send an e-mail to accounts@byc.ca requesting that your e-mail address be added or updated.

This is a trial, to get feedback from the membership on how useful it is, to get ideas for improvements and new features, and (hopefully not) to get bugs reported and fixed. You will note that these web pages do not conform to the look and feel of the BYC web site - we are concentrating on the function at present. Thus comments on the appearance of these pages should be avoided.

To access these new pages, select Member Login from the bottom right corner of the main BYC web page. Then select Member Area from the menu at the top of the page that appears.

In order to use the member area, you will first

need to register. Fill in the on-line registration form, noting that the userid you choose must be unique, so don't just use your first name (unless it is unique!). Your password will be e-mailed to you at the address we have on file in the membership system. The e-mail address you enter in the registration form is just used to help validate your identity.

Once you have received your password, you can then login to the system, and change your password to something more reasonable.

Note that if you check the box to save your userid and password, and you have cookies enabled; the system will log you on automatically when you visit the member area.

The data you see is live data - changes you make will be reflected in the Membership System (after vetting by Mark, our Accountant).

We encourage you to try out the Member Area and provide us with feedback.

LT. CDR. GEORGE COOK

Lieutenant-Commander George Douglas Cook - long time past member of the Britannia Yacht Club - served as bomb-disposal officer at Haifa during 1941 and 1942.

The following citation accompanied the awarding of a bar to the George Medal, which he had already won.

"A mine was dropped on shore at Haifa and Lieutenant Cook took charge of the disposal of it. He identified it as a type that has a series of devices meant to explode if it is not fully immersed as a mine. Since it had not exploded he suspected that some defect had developed which might rectify itself of its own accord or through incautious interference. Therefore he decided not to risk moving it but to strip it on the spot. The area was ordered to be cleared next day. Some 14,000 people were affected and the site was sandbagged and a tent put up over the mine. The complicated operation of stripping the mine took Lieutenant Cook 3 ½ hours of patient work, part of it done in total darkness, since this type of mine has an explosive device sensitive to light, with the knowledge that if he made one mistake he would have no warning and no chance of escape."

Our hardworking and enthusiastic Social Committee has already engineered successful events at the Club and deserves our whole-hearted support. They have proposed a number of social events that will take place immediately following some of our up-river races -

notably Pinheys and Queen's Park for starters. Make sure to come out and join the fun!

This year we are celebrating the 50th anniversary of the National Capital Regatta. The event will be co-chaired by Carina Duclos and the veteran Joan Yuile. As well as the usual players, we will be hosting the Laser District 3 Championships, the Laser Gold Cup #5 and the Ontario Women's Dinghy Championships. 
as a whole, because the more boats on the start line, the more interesting the racing.
