

HARBOUR REPORT

In writing this article I referred to Full & By from the previous year. In the 2014 issue I wrote that the winter of 2013-2014 would be remembered as one the coldest and snowiest winters in current time. This year the winter has surpassed records for cold in February with the only benefit being in the record setting days open for the Rideau Skating Canal. The Great Lakes are once again approaching the 1979 record of 94% frozen with a report of 85% on February 24, 2015 vs 92.2% in March of 2014. The fact that two almost record setting years back to back would be very unusual according to George Leshkevka, a physical scientist with the NOAA Great Lakes Environmental Research Laboratory in Ann Arbor.

Big boat launch date is scheduled for Friday, May 1, and hopefully the spring weather will be co-operative in achieving preparedness for the upcoming season. Updates will be provided at the Boat Owners' Meeting on April 12 at 1:00pm in the Dragon Lounge. At the time of this meeting we are hoping to have more concrete details of the new KROPF Docks and placements, as well as the installation date.

When preparing boats for spring launch please use the various garbage receptacles located within the

compound, and use an approved City of Ottawa Recycling Centre for your waste oil and fuel. Battery recycling at the Bruce Shed is still available.

I want to thank Steve Glover, Daryl Cormier, David Foy, Dan Wideman, George Clayburn and Kevin Bundy for standing for the 2015 Harbour Committee. I am also pleased to report that Andrew and Peter will be returning in the spring to continue their much appreciated work and commitment to the BYC Harbour.

Please ensure that your mooring fees and insurance forms are up to date with Mark Walton at the office prior to launch.

Booking early for the big blue crane launch will assist in planning for the harbour crew and is welcomed.







SPRING 2015 UP-RIVER RACING

Judging by the view from the Champlain Lookout, the Ottawa River is getting ready for us to begin the upriver racing season. Alas, several things need to be done before we can start. The really good opportunity to fiberglass and paint happens in late March and April only if the weather cooperates. Hopefully those of us who suffered this Winter without complaining will experience the reward of some warmth before launch.

In the last two years the River, under the influence of spring, needed time to come out of its thaw-induced highs. Who is prepared to guess when the harbour gate will be opened? Maybe it is not necessary to jump into the icy water but, hopefully, with patience, planning and cooperation we may all be in the water and racing more or less when we want. Round -the-buoys racing starts at the beginning of May (gates permitting), but upriver racers have some more time to prepare, albeit not long.

The first upriver race, the Shorey, is on Monday, May 18, which comes fast even though it seems a long time away for us in the snow belt. Sailors traditionally have a leisurely upriver holiday weekend only to meet at mid-day Monday to race back to the Club. The start is set by the committee boat at Sand Point, the far side of Constance Bay, but there is continuing talk of possibly moving the start a little further down river for those who may wish to sail up from Britannia on the Monday morning. Check the notice.

The Spring 50 Mile race follows remarkably quickly and can be in a cold Spring storm a still Summer-like heat-wave, or an unpredictable variety of both. This race takes us to Mohr Island, the limit of normal navigation on our part of the River - the extensions to Quyon and Pontiac Bay being too slow for a round-trip race. The long daylight close to the Solstice is a good

opportunity for an enjoyable long day-sail. Rounding K16, the buoy at Mohr Island, in a fast Spring current is a particular challenge. Determined racers prepare for overnight sailing or, for the semi-determined, anchoring.

In between is a new initiative, an early Jefferson Pursuit round-the-buoys race, possibly with one or two more races to make up a full day. The Jefferson Pursuit used to be very popular. Faster boats start after the slower boats according to their PHRF. This, with good preparation to set the course appropriately, gives all boats a chance to cross the finish line first.

All of these races have been cancelled in the last two years because of high Spring water levels. Except for the Shorey, which has a specific time in its deed of gift, there will be an effort to re-schedule cancelled races

Meanwhile the yard crew and race officer will appreciate our perfect combination of politeness, competitive spirit and conformity with racing rules




As stated in the last issue of Full & By, PHRF has instituted 1% sail measurement changes. In March, they decided to credit mains smaller by percentages from 103%, the old maximum. Old sails do stretch, so it may or may not be beneficial to re-measure.

As always, I am available to help (with a 100' tape measure); but you are responsible for the numbers that go in.

I have renewed all the certificates that are marked paid by the Club's Accountant as of March 12. You may verify the state of your certificate on the PHRF web site.

The normal notice applies:

- 1) If you have not paid the fee(s), now is a good time to do so. You will not be scored until the fee is received by the Club.
- 2) If you have a boat new to the Club or yourself you need to fill out a PHRF form before racing, in addition to registration. A good time to ask questions is at the Spring Sailor's meeting.
- 3) If you are no longer racing, then do nothing and your certificate will naturally expire this year.



Spring has sprung and let the thaw begin!


So much exciting activity at the Club these days, and very happy to see new and old faces, the snowbirds are returning!
